The Local Authority attendance guidelines advise that any attendance below 96% is considered poor and below 90% is considered as persistent absence. Poor attendance can


have a detrimental effect on your child's progress at school. As a school, we closely monitor attendance.

- Email or letter from NHS Dr or medical practitioner including a nurse.
- Text of telephone consultation.
- Medication bottle or box.
- Pharmaceutical Consultation.

It is also very important to inform us if your child is unable to attend school on each day of absence. Thank you for your support.

Appointments

Please try to make appointments out of school hours. If this is unavoidable then please ensure pupils are aware at what time they need to meet you at the school office.

Years 7-9

All pupils must be collected from reception by a parent / carer or responsible adult aged over 18 years. A letter or appointment card to be handed in at reception when signing out.

Years 10 & 11

Pupils are allowed to make their own way to appointments if they have a letter of authorisation from a parent / carer or a phone call has been received by office staff (letters must be handed in at reception and either copied or kept as confirmation evidence).

Unwell Pupils

Head of Year must authorise pupils to go home (unless medical emergency). All pupils to be collected from reception by a parent / carer or responsible adult over 18 years. Depending on the nature of illness some pupils are allowed to be sent home via taxi if the parent / carer requests - Head of Year must authorise this.



Bee Well Mental Health Champions



This term we have had a real push on the Bee Well Mental Health Level 2 qualification with 16 Year 9 pupils.

We have been to Radcliffe Market to see local companies and see how we can spend their £5000 to help improve our pupils' wellbeing within our local community.

We have then chosen 3 favorites, being: Bury Defence Academy, Hear me Roar (which is a musical charity that was set up after the Manchester bombing) and finally Alfa Education which is a company in Bury which teaches people to play different musical instruments.

We will be splitting the £5000 across all 3 companies with more going to Bury Defence Club as we feel more people would benefit from this. We aim to provide so many free sessions per week for Philips High School children over the summer holidays to help them stay active and get out of the house.

We have also been given a sum on £1500 to help advertise the 3 companies which we have been studying during form time , so pupils know how to get involved.

This has been a fantastic programme for the pupils and they will receive a Level 2 qualification, we then aim to work as a group over the next few years to improve wellbeing at our school.

Mr. Barlow will be meeting with certain members of staff before the end of this term to discuss how we can implement the Wellbeing Programme into character lessons for next year. Each pupil will have 2 character lessons at the start of each term next year so that wellbeing is constantly being discussed.

It has been another amazing ye<mark>ar at Philips High Sc</mark>hool and numerous things have happened throughout the year fi<mark>nishing with Spo</mark>rts Day and Trips Day which I know all staff and pupils involved really enjoyed.

Certain staff have also completed a 6-week yoga programme which took place every Tuesday evening 4:30-5:30pm. Staff that were involved loved it and saw progress being made.

CADET SUMMER CAMP



For Summer Camp this year we took 30 cadets to Barry Buddon Training Camp in Scotland. The cadets had 4 days packed with activities. On Sunday the cadets spent the day on the range where they had the opportunity to shoot the Cadets GP rifle from 100m and 200m. During this activity we had most cadets passing their BASIC shooting assessment and some of our senior cadets were able to achieve their ADVANCED. Senior cadets were also given a behind the scenes insight into how the targets works and all cadets got to try electronic clay pigeon shooting. On Monday cadets were split into groups to complete a round robin of activities. This included a silent drill test, navigation exercise, paintball fire and manoeuvres, paintball CQB, stalking exercise and command tasks.

Tuesday/Wednesday was the start of the grand finale. Cadets spent the day learning, practicing and planning section attacks and patrols. After setting up camp in the forest and cooking their own dinners, they completed a night exercise before sleeping in the shelters they had built. The following day, they put all there training into practice and succeeded in completing a rolling section attack.

CADET SUMMER CAMP

Camp ended on Wednesday night with a BBQ style dinner and Disco. This camp was an amazing

opportunity for our cadets. Apart from the activities themselves, the overall camp was comprised of 9 different schools with over 300 cadets from all over the UK. This gave our cadets a unique experience, allowing them to meet and work with students their own

age from all walks of life.

In school students are seeing their achievements celebrated on our Events Noticeboard. This is on the top corridor opposite room F4 and is the place to go to find out about future events.



UK Biology Challenge

The UK Biology Challenge is a prestigious international competition open to students around the world. This year, over 43,685 students from 621 comprehensive and independent schools took part in the competition across the UK.

This is an academic challenge where pupils have to sit two online exams.

This is Philips' second year of entering the competition and we have had fantastic results. This year, two of our pupils were awarded Gold, one received Silver and fourteen achieved Bronze Awards.

Of the remaining pupils fifteen were Highly Commended and another twenty were Commended. In total 55% of Philips pupils who took part in the challenge received an award. A very impressive set of results for only our second attempt. Well done to everyone who took part!

Holy Cross visited 31 of our Year 10 pupils to talk to them about KS5 languages. Pupils found the talk very insightful and enjoyed hearing about the successes of former Holy Cross pupils who have gone on to enjoy successes using skills acquired whilst doing A level languages.







MANCHESTER UNITED FOUNDATION



- 87% of the pupils said the workshop made them more aware of how to access the pathways for future development.

Each student received a badge and postcards – how cool are these?


