PHILIPS GETS A SIMPSONS MAKEOVER

Philips High School has been given a yellow-tinted makeover after appearing in the latest Simpsons-style artwork by popular digital creator OnlyMancs.

Known for his distinctive "reimagining" of Greater Manchester towns and neighbourhoods, OnlyMancs shared his newest piece on **Tuesday, December 2**, turning the familiar streets of **Whitefield** into a scene straight out of Springfield.

The illustration features an array of instantly recognisable local landmarks, all transformed into the iconic cartoon style made famous by The Simpsons. Among them are **Philips High School**, the **Whitefield Metrolink station**, **Slattery Chocolatiers**, **Melis Mediterranean restaurant off Balmoral Avenue**, **the Goat's Gate pub**, **State Fayre Bakery**, **Morrisons**, and several other well-known spots. Philips High School stands out as a central part of the artwork, celebrating the role the school plays within the community while giving it a playful animated twist.

The attention to detail across the piece has struck a chord with locals, many of whom were quick to spot their favourite buildings and share the post online.

OnlyMancs has built a strong following by transforming Greater Manchester locations into vibrant cartoon scenes, from town centres to transport hubs and independent businesses. Whitefield is the latest area to receive the treatment, joining a growing collection of Greater Manchester communities immortalised in the artist's instantly recognisable style.

As with previous works, the piece has sparked plenty of conversation, with residents praising both the accuracy of the landmarks and the nostalgic charm of seeing their hometown through a Simpsons-inspired lens.

If issued, penalty notices are issued to each parent of each child and the amount of the penalty will be £160 to be paid within 28 days (£80 if paid within 21 days). Penalty notices will also be considered for 10 sessions of unauthorised absence in a 10 week period.
