This term has been very busy with year 11 GCSEs and end of year exams for years 7–10. However, we have still managed to squeeze in a few extra events aimed at enriching and broadening the curriculum in science.

CREST AWARD

Year 9 completed an extended practical project during the Spring term. Two projects were completed across all of year 9. Students were first taught the content and then re-taught the practical skills. Then, as groups of 3–4 and through a series of practical's, students directed their own investigation. This project saw most of our Year 9 students achieving a Bronze CREST award. There were two projects that were being completed in Year 9 that were accredited for CREST bronze award: Food and Medicine.

Year 7 students have started their CREST journey and are currently completing a project on Dehydration which is linked to the Summer Olympics in France. This project is designed to accredit them for a Discovery CREST award in Autumn.

Normally, CREST awards are completed as an after-school club. Whilst some schools do complete whole year group awards it is rare. We are very proud of our year 7 and year 9s for rising to the challenge of these projects. These projects have greatly improved their practical skills in the classroom and their ability to apply their knowledge in different scenarios. CREST awards are well known to improve science results.



UK Biology competition

140 students from Years 9 and 10 joined 45,400 students world-wide to participate in the challenge this year. A range of schools compete in this challenge from independent, selective, comprehensive, religious, academy etc. The challenge is not easy and makes the students think when completing it. It consists of two computer-based assessments that are timed, and students need to reach a certain percentage of correct answers as well as beat several students to be awarded certain certificates. The boundary for each certificate changes each year depending on the students' marks. Students may be awarded as follows;

Gold - 5% of students

Silver - 10% of students

Bronze - 10% of students

Highly Commended - 15% of students

Commended - 15% of students



British Science week

This year's theme was TIME. Year 8 were given the choice to either; • Create an obstacle course so that a marble rolled down a ramp in exactly 10 seconds or

Determine the mass of sand required and diameter of hole needed in the bottom of a cup of sand to empty the cup in exactly 10 seconds or
Determine the volume of water required and diameter of hole in the bottom of a cup of water to empty the cup in exactly 10 seconds.
Students worked in teams to design, carry out preliminary investigations, redesign and test before the final 10 second test. Some groups got very close to the 10 second mark, others did not, but all students improved their grasp of the scientific method and peer review.





The Island

As part of our commitment to supporting students in understanding different careers in science, Year 9 are currently completing a projectbased unit of work centred on The Island. The Island has no electricity. Students have been tasked to assign roles within their groups, research possible energy sources, based on the natural resources and land topography, collect some data from experiments completed in the lab and then debate their final ideas as a group to agree on a final proposal for the Island. This final proposal is to be written in letter format to The Island's elders' government. This project works to not only improve students understanding of energy resources and think about their implications on the environment but also looks at careers such as project management, politician and environmental lawyer. In addition, it improves soft skills such as working in a team, listening to other people's viewpoints, coming to an agreement and healthy debate and argument for a purpose.

STEM Club

STEM Club has been running all year until Easter on a Monday after school for year 7. This year many of the activities were centred on engineering. Next year STEM Club will be open for year 7 and 8 with lots of new and different activities. Returning students from year 7 into year 8 completing a second year in STEM Club will be considered senior students in the club and able to support the younger students.

Attendance Guidelines

The Local Authority attendance guidelines advise that any attendance below 96% is considered poor and below 90% is considered as persistent absence. Poor attendance can have a detrimental effect on your child's progress at school. As a school, we closely monitor attendance.

It is important that pupils arrive at registration and lessons on time. If pupils are late they will receive a late mark on the register, a strike on their Star card and a Detention.

If attendance falls below 92% medical evidence will be required.

It is also very important to inform us if your child is unable to attend school **on each day of absence.**
